The Power of the Middle

## The Big Idea

When Dr. Pam Ross sought the Lord for a word over Kingdom Culture, He gave two deceptively simple words: "Continue on." Not slow down, not start over, not chase the next new thing — just keep driving straight ahead and don't turn your plow. The middle is where God forms us; beginnings excite us and endings get celebrated, but character is built in the middle. Obedience moves from doing to being: when God gives you something to do, He is really making you into someone to be. Through Joseph, Noah, and Daniel, the call is to a grown-up faith that keeps going — in faith, in obedience, through opposition, and before the breakthrough is ever visible.

## Key Takeaways

- The word is "Continue on" — keep going in faith, in obedience, when outcomes look different, through opposition, and before results are visible.
- Joseph: continue trusting God even when doing right costs you. He doesn't always give His full intention with His full instruction.
- Noah: obedience precedes the evidence — continue before your confirmation ever appears.
- Daniel: obedience matured into identity — he prayed "as was his custom," no longer something he did but who he was.
- From doing to being: fatigue is a clue you're pushing from the outside in. Let the assignment become part of who you are.
- Measure your maturity by your complaints — baby, toddler, teenager, frustrated young adult. Feast for strength, not for drunkenness.

- 7** Where are you "trying to do the work and nitpick yourself at the same time"? What would receiving the "ease of God" actually change?



# Called to Build

Dr. Jaquet Dumas · Session Overview

Stop Attending Where You Were Called to Build

## The Big Idea

There's a difference between an attender and a builder — and the call of this season is to stop attending where you were called to build. God doesn't assign you to a space merely for access (a seat, a badge, the right to be in the room); He assigns you for assignment. Access asks, "Can I be here?" Assignment asks, "What am I here to do?" The health of a whole house depends on participation, not attendance. Using Nehemiah — a disposable cupbearer who carried a burden nobody handed him — Dr. Dumas maps the path from burden to building. It was never a place we were meant to attend; it was always a people we were meant to become.

- Access vs. assignment: don't settle for being in the room — know what you were actually sent to do.
- Three levels in the house: the titled, the faithful servers, and the present-but-unnecessary. Impact, not title, is the measure.
- The Builder's Roadmap: see it, carry it, say it, then invite others into it.
- God builds through people — we are the living stones. He's building a house, not just gathering an audience.
- Four reasons people stay attenders: misunderstood identity, consumer conditioning, unhealed disappointment, and no clarity on assignment.
- Your complaint is connected to your grace — the thing you keep noticing may be the very wall you were sent to build.

- 7** Have I said my assignment out loud to someone who can hold me accountable? If I've kept it silent, what am I protecting?

- 8** Whom am I called to invite onto the wall with me — and do I have the language to actually teach them to build, not just show up?

Building on the Word of the Prophets

## The Big Idea

In 2008 a single article led the Dumases across the country to meet Matthew Stevenson, and out of that friendship came a movement that didn't yet exist: Kingdom Culture. Faithful to prophetic order, a 2009 booklet of prophecies declared exactly what it would become — then sat largely untouched for years, until the Lord pressed one charge on their hearts: "Remember the blueprint." Reopening it, they were stunned at how precisely God had spoken what later came to pass. Nothing is built rightly without prophetic foundations (Amos 3:7), and the four 2026 initiatives are simply the next layer of obedience to a blueprint already given.

- Remember the blueprint: you don't build anything without what God already said about it (Amos 3:7).
- The four 2026 initiatives: Renaissance Prophetic School, Fifth Wednesday Signite, LEAD, and Fivefold Pathways.
- Prayer is the DNA of the movement — "you won't like anything about Kingdom Culture if you don't want to pray."
- Steward the prototype: build it God's way, not the convenient, comfortable way.
- There is no new word — build what God already told you to build, the way He told you to build it.
- Dust off your prophecies: retrieve, gather, discern, track, and contend for them again.
